But the indignity doesn't stop there. Outside there is plenty to keep you bemused. You can watch monkeys ride scooters and enjoy pig and duck races over an assault course, complete with 4metre-high jumps into cold water. You will never see pigs swim anywhere else in the world!

You can then end your day with a fight or two. You can cheer on rams head-butting each other with their enormous horns, and you can watch cockerels rip each other apart with their claws.



Clean & Safe



In many major cities across China, you can be rest assured you will be safe from the ominous threat of large dogs and stray dogs.

Souvenir Shopping
